



SOLOMON ISLANDS NATIONAL GENERAL ELECTION 2019

DATA ANALYSIS

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1. Voter Registration Analysis

a) Registered Voters and Estimated Population by gender and province

The number of registered voters for 2019 general election is 359, 523. Out of the total registered voters, 185,006 are male (51.46%) and 174,517 are female (48.54%). The proportion of registered male voters and registered female voters has remained almost the same as in the 2014 voter’s roll with a slightly higher number of registered male voters.

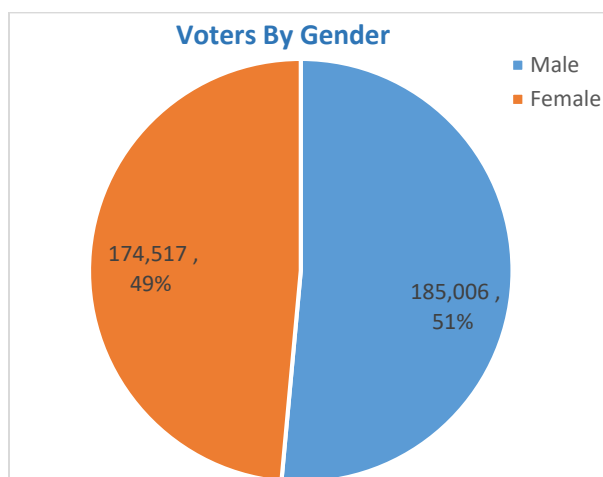


Figure 1: Registered Voters by gender

The last census for population was conducted in 2009. At that time the total population was 515, 870. From different sources, the estimated population for 2018 (year during which the voter registration

updated was conducted prior to the 2019 national general election) was found to be 660,314. So, the growth rate can be estimated in approximately 1.28% of increase.

The following table reflects the application of this estimated growth rate (1.28%) at provincial level.

The graph shows the registered voters and population in each province.

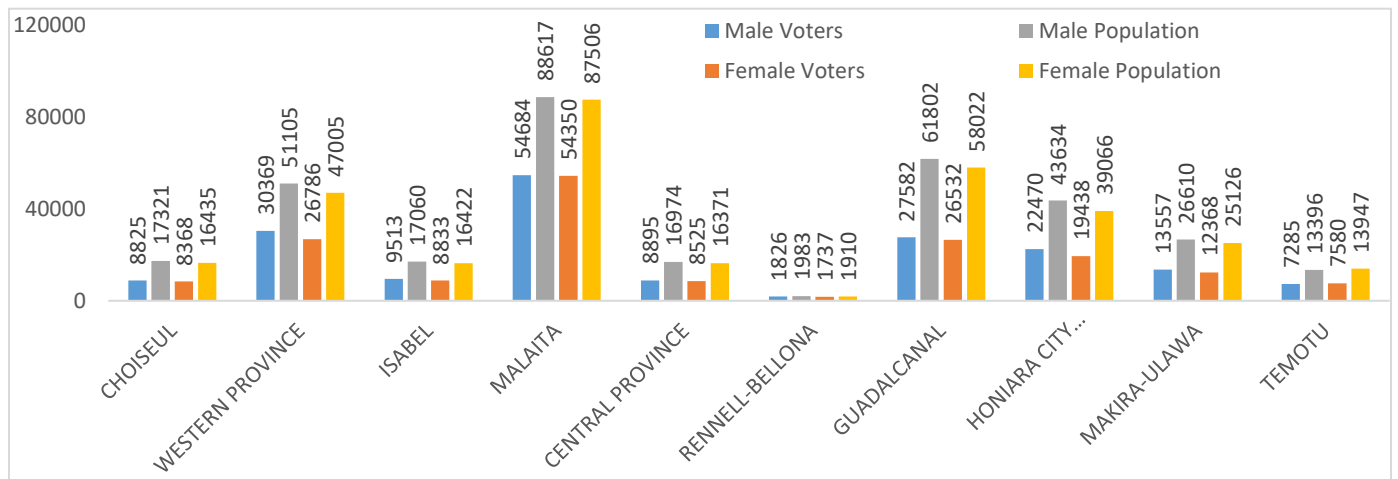


Figure 2: Graph showing registered voters and estimated population distribution by gender and province

The estimated population was found to be 660,314 whereas the total registered voters are 359,523. It is noted that an important segment of the population of Solomon Islands are youth under voting age. Therefore, according to the estimated figures, 300,791 people have not been registered as voters and the majority are deemed to be under voting age (less than 18 years of age).

The table below provides an estimation of the age breakdown population for 2018. The table reflects a segment of citizens with age ranging 0-15 (not eligible for voting) which is calculated to be 224, 743 citizens

resulting in 76, 408 citizens (300,791 minus 224,743) from 15+ ages not registered as voters. This figure should still be reduced by the estimated figure of citizens in the range 15-18. Thus remaining % of population that are not registered yet in voter lists is less than 17.46% (76, 408). It can be therefore be concluded that the percentage of citizens included in the 2018 voter registration is probably within 85 to 90% of the eligible population.

The table below shows the comparison of estimated population against registered voters and total number of eligible voters still not registered. From the table, citizens within 15-24 yet to be registered seems to be higher. This is due to the fact that it contains under age voters too (citizens within 15-18 years). Thus eligible citizens that are not registered within 15-24 range should be less than 47,314. The table will be more useful if there is exact data for population.

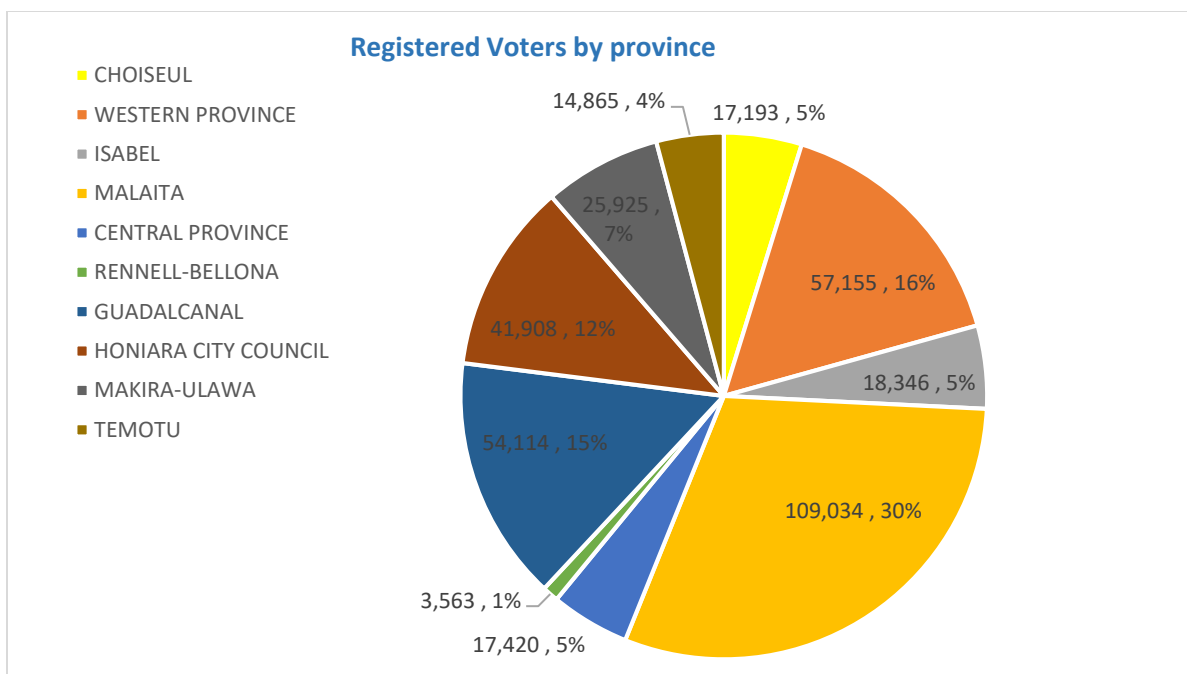


Figure 3: Pie chart showing registered voters by province

b) Registered Voters by age group

The table shows registered voters by the following age groups: 18-21, 22-35, 36-55, 56-70 and 70+. The age 70+ is taken as limit as the statistics show that life expectancy of Solomon Islanders are found to be around 70.

An important segment of the population of Solomon Islands are young adults. The combined age group (18-21 and 22-35) can be considered as youth group³. With a view to identify eligible new voters, an age group of those within 18 to 21 years of age has been set which covers 13.33% of registered voters. Specific analysis of this group is provided in the next section. The age group 22-35 covers 39.76% of registered voters. Combining 18-21 and 22-35 age group covers more than 50% of registered voters. (53.09%). Other details can be seen from the table and graph.

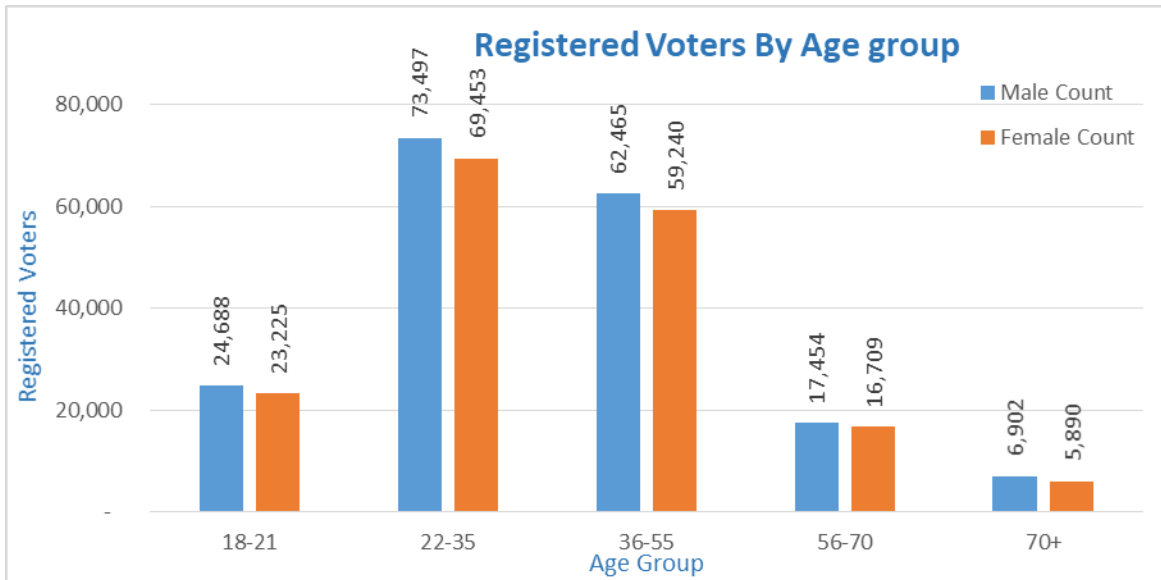


Figure 4: Registered Voters by age group

First Time Voters

It is difficult to calculate as data is not available when they have been registered for the first time. Given the fact that last National General Election was conducted in November 2014, an assumption can be made that those eligible voters in the age groups between 18-21 are first time voters as at the time of 2014 elections, they were under age. This age group covers 13.33 % of registered voters. In absolute terms, this means 47,913 voters under this age group 18-21 are considered as first time voters for the 2019 national general election.

c) 2014 -2019 Voters Comparison

The below table shows the comparison of registered voters in 2014 and 2019⁴

The total registered voters in 2014 was 287,562. As a result of the 2018-2019 voter registration exercise, the number of entries in the electoral roll increased to 359,523 in 2018 with the addition of 71,961 eligible voters.

By sex, male registered voters increased from 148,504 to 185,006 and female registered voters increased from 139,058 to 174,517. The composition of male and female registered voters slightly changed from 2014 to 2019. The male registered voters composition decreased from 51.64% to 51.46% whereas the female registered voters composition increased from 48.36% to 48.54% in 2019.

d) Constituency distribution by Provinces

Out of 9 provinces and Honiara City Council, Malaita has the largest number of constituencies i.e. 14 whereas Rennell-Bellona has only one constituency. Western province has got nine constituencies and GuadalCanal has eight constituencies.

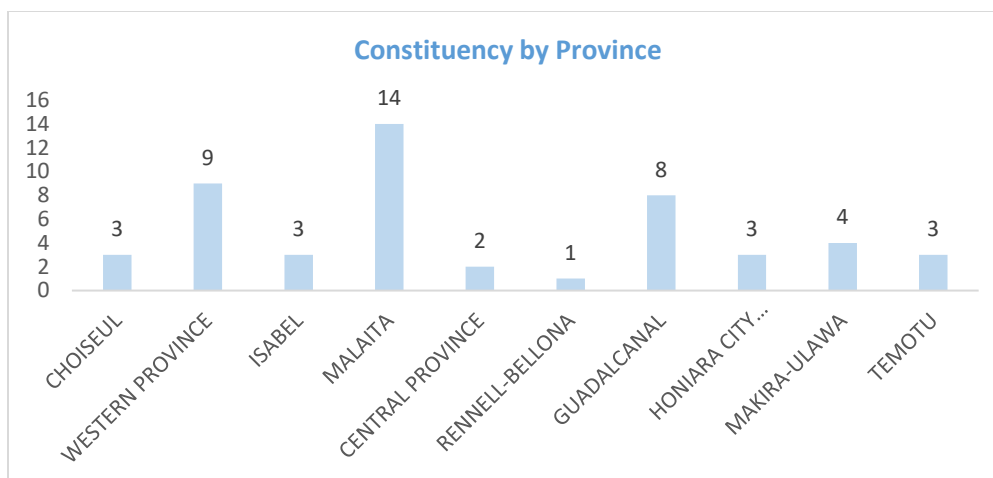


Figure 5: Constituencies by province

e) Allocation of registered voters, candidates, seats by province

The table below shows the allocation of registered voters, seats and candidates in each province by gender. This comparison, enables to assess whether the proportion of allocation of seats to each province remains proportional to % of registered voters in that province. It also compares % of registered voters with % candidacy by gender. The table reflects that while figures for male and female eligible voters very close in all provinces, candidate distribution by gender presents very low figures for women candidates.

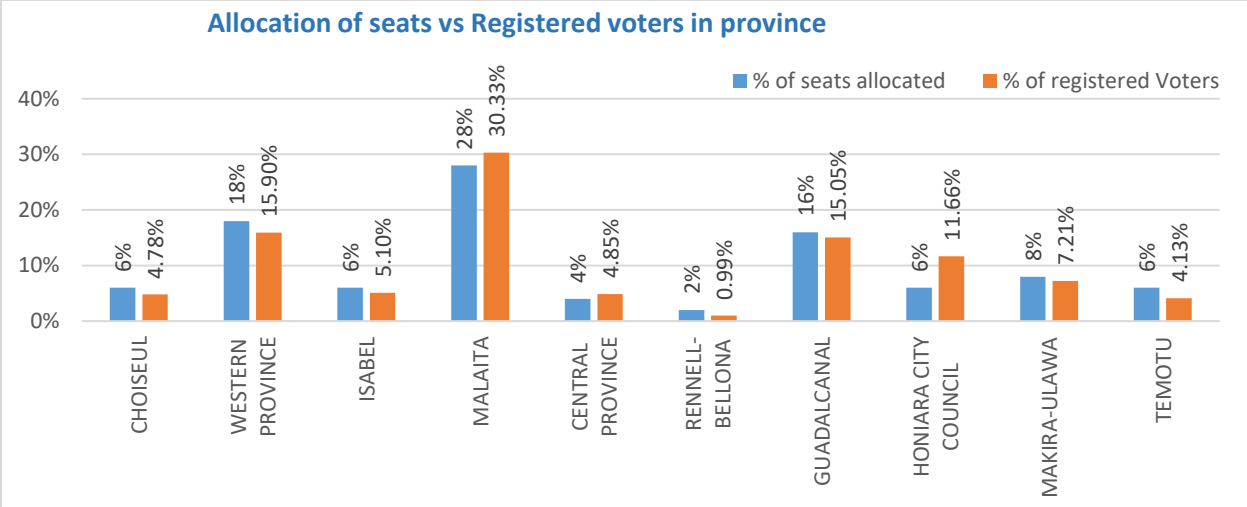


Figure 6: Comparison of allocation of seats vs registered voters in province

2. Election Day Reporting Tools

The officers in polling centers need to report to central office for election day reporting. To this effect, a template was developed to be used in election day reporting.

Getting sex disaggregated data of the voter turn-out is difficult⁵.

To overcome these difficulties, a proposal has been made developing a template which could be used in polling stations. However, this methodology will require collaboration at polling station level to appoint a person to collect sex disaggregated voter turn-out.

Both templates have been provided in the appendix A and appendix B.

3. Election materials/assets database

Election materials can be categorized as sensitive materials and non-sensitive materials. Sensitive materials include ballot papers, ballot boxes, seals to be used in ballot boxes, stamps, printed voter lists. During the 2019 national election, specific serial numbers have been used with specific codes for each constituency. This way it will be difficult for outsiders to re-produce the serial numbers for ballot papers.

Non-sensitive materials are other supplementary materials used in polling stations such as string, stationeries necessary for the polling day.

The materials used in polling station are given in appendix C.

⁵ Voter lists produced by the SI Electoral Office do not reflect gender. To collect sex disaggregated data would require verification of photographic images and first names in the voters lists. This is considered not time efficient and unreliable methodology which can result in multiple errors.

4. National General Election (NGE) Results 2019

1. Candidate Composition analysis in NGE 2019

332 candidates contested the 2019 national general election. Out of this figure, 306 were males and 26 candidates were female candidates. 162 candidates run independently whereas 170 run as political party candidates.

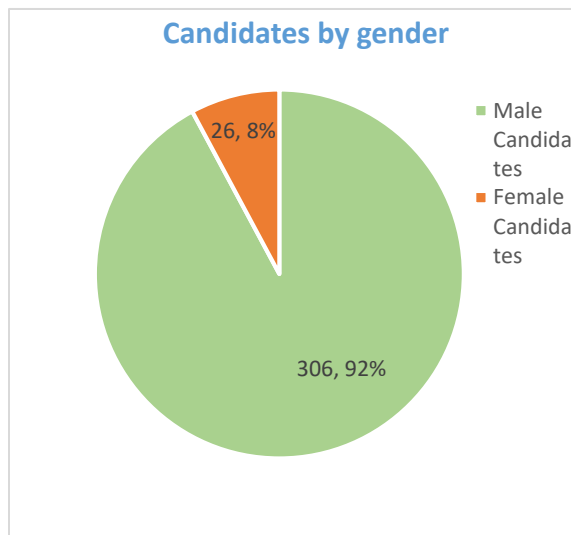


Figure 7: Candidates by gender

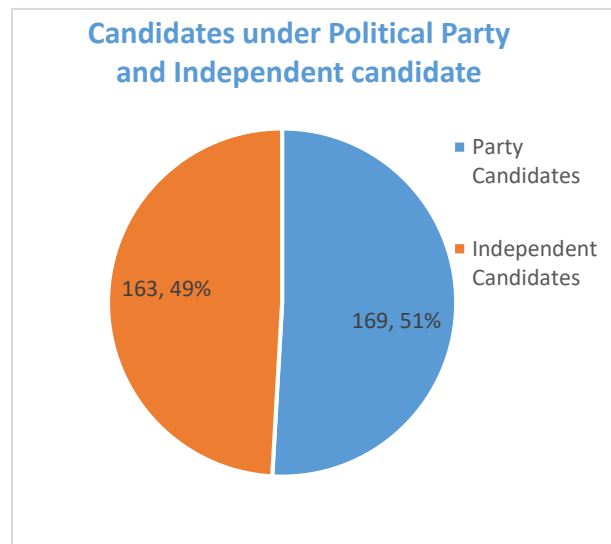


Figure 8: Candidates by Political Party Candidates and Independent Candidates

Malaita, the most populated province, had the largest number of candidates, i.e. ninety three (93) and Rennell-Bellona had the smallest, six (6). Rennell-Bellona is the only province without any women candidates.

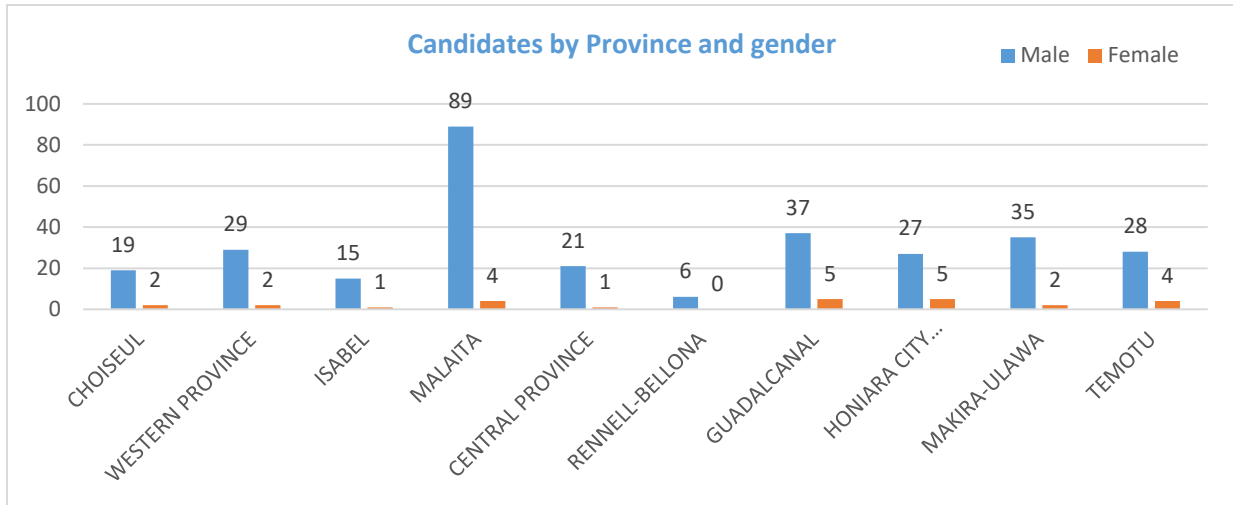


Figure 9: Candidates by province and gender

2. NGE results by nominated and elected candidates

Thirteen (13) political parties contested the 2019 NGE and only eight (8) parties got seats in one or more than one constituency. Five (5) parties could not get any seats.

Solomon Islands KADERE Party and Solomon Islands Democratic Party got the highest number of seats, eight (8) seats each. United Democratic Party got four (4) seats, Democratic Alliance Party got three (3) seats, Peoples Alliance Party and Solomon Islands United Party got two (2) seats each, Solomon Islands Party for Rural Advancement and People First Party got 1/1 seats.

Independent candidates got a total of 21 seats.

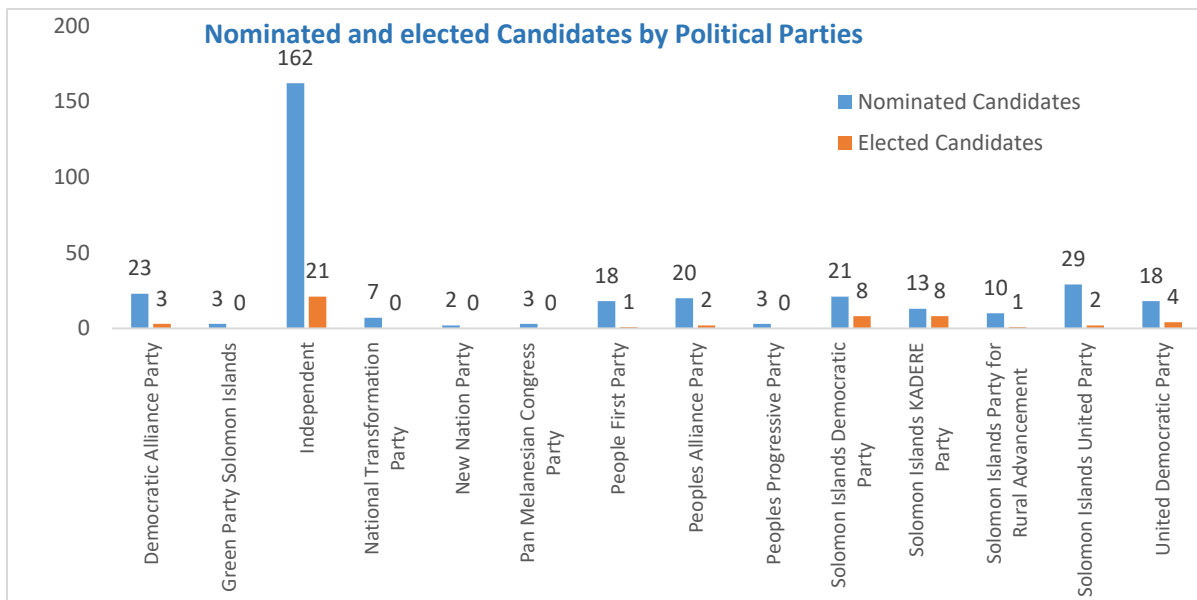


Figure 10: Nominated and elected candidates by political parties

The table below shows number of candidates nominated for elections and elected candidates by gender. In NGE 2019, 306 men candidates contested for the election and 48 of them got elected and out of 26 women candidates who contested, two (2) got elected. In 2014 NGE, out of 471 men candidates contested for election, 49 got elected and out of 26 women candidates, one got elected.

In relative terms, the percentage of elected candidates over nominated candidates was 15.69% for male candidates while for women, it was 7.69% in NGE 2019. For 2014 NGE, the figures are 10.40% for men and 3.85% for women.

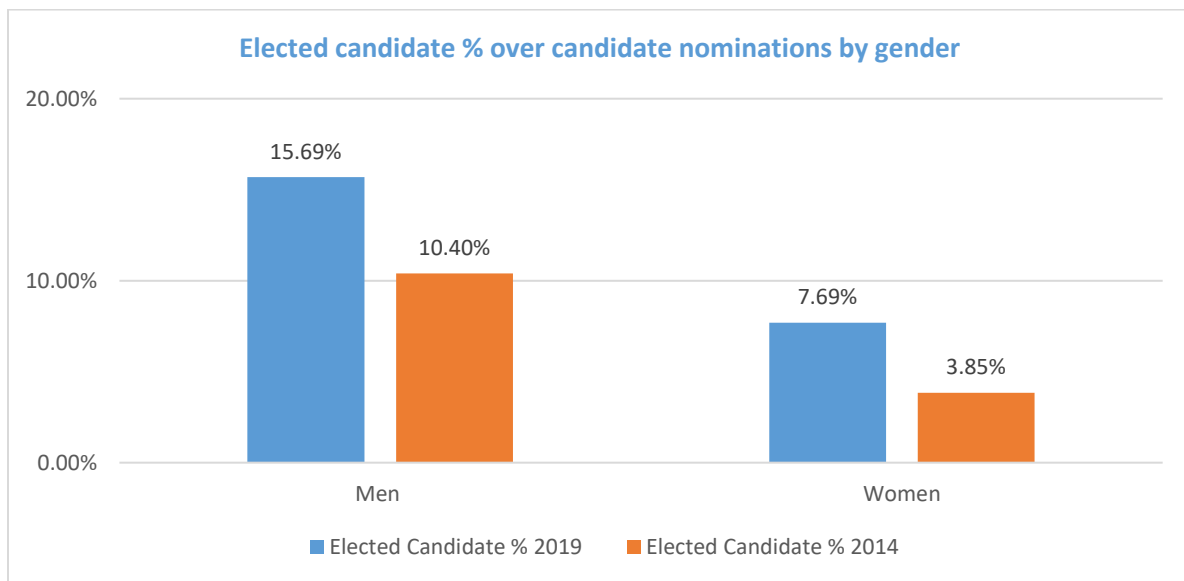


Figure 11: Elected candidate % over Candidate nominations by gender

Comparison of Elected seats for political parties and independent candidates in 2014 and 2019

In 2014 NGE, political party candidates got elected in 18 seats out of 50 seats making 36% of total seats whereas in 2019, the seats increased to 29 making 58% of total seats. This means an increase of 22% in the number of seats obtained by political parties' candidates. In 2014 NGE, the independent candidates have been elected in 32 constituencies whereas in 2019 the number of seats won by independent candidates decreased to 21.

Out of 14 new comers, 8 candidates are from independent and 6 are from political parties. Details are shown below

3. NGE 2019 Results Summary

The overall turn out for National General Elections came to be 86.41% with the highest voter turnout of 95.81% in West Guadalcanal constituency and lowest of 74.85% in Central Honiara constituency.

Out of 310,667 votes cast all over the country, a total 902 votes were invalid. Details provided in appendix number F.

4. Comparison of women candidate results in 2014 and 2019 National General Election

In 2014 out of 26 candidates, only one candidate got elected whereas in 2019 with the same number of candidates, two women got elected as members of the national parliament.

Out of 26 women candidates, 7 candidates had already participated in 2014 general elections.

In 2019, the overall number of votes received by women candidates was higher than in 2014. In current general elections 2019, women got 4.49% of total votes cast whereas in 2014, only 2.72% of the votes were cast for women candidates. Therefore, while the number of female candidates has remained the same (26), there has been an increase of 1.78% of the electorate that have chosen to vote for women candidates.

One of women candidates was able to secure more than 50% in 2019 whereas none of the women candidates secured more than 50% of votes in 2014. Further, three (3) women candidates secured between 30-50% of votes in 2019 however in 2014 none of the candidates reached the 30-40% of the votes.

Similarly for men candidates in 2019 NGE, 23 men candidates secured more than 50% of votes in 2019 NGE whereas 14 candidates secured more than 50% of votes in 2014 NGE. In 2019 NGE, 41 men candidates secured 30-50% votes whereas in 2014 NGE, only 36 candidates got 30-50% votes. In 2019, fourteen (14) candidates have secured less votes than in 2014 however the remaining candidates have obtained more % of votes than in 2014. The details are given in Appendix D.
